Father Mark writes:

More than half of the world's population will be taking part in popular elections this year. Is this surge of democracy something to rejoice about? Many of those voting across the world – over more than 80 countries – will do so with eager excitement. In some countries people will travel miles to queue for hours before they can exercise their right to vote. Some elections will be marred by corruption, in countries where people envy the freedoms we can take for granted. It has been said that the results of these elections across a changing world may change the course of history.

In the UK many people will greet yet another election more negatively. Some of us may feel something like Brenda, interviewed in Bristol in 2017: 'You're joking. Not another one!'



Probably this reflects an increasing lack of trust in those we have elected to represent us. Surveys show that, in the UK, trust in politicians is lower than any other profession, indeed it is lower than it has ever been (Ipsos Veracity Index, December 2023).

One starting point, as we begin to think about our own rights and responsibilities as citizens of a representative democracy, are the opening words of the second chapter of the short Letter to Timothy. We are not absolutely sure which one of St Paul's followers compiled this set of instructions to a Bishop in the early church, but his words were regarded as of sufficient importance to be included in the New Testament. Writing at a time of persecution and tyranny he urges Timothy and all early Christians to pray for all rulers – so that everyone 'may live quiet and peaceful lives as we worship and honour God' (1 Timothy 2:2 CEV).

It is important that we pray for those who seek to rule us. If we do that, we may find it easier not to be influenced by those who seek to promote cynicism or conflict in the political life of our nation for their own motives. Whatever our own political allegiances, however strong our doubts, it is important also to pray that we will be wise as we use our votes on 4 July – and to pray after as well as before we do so.

Chichester Cathedral Festival of Flowers 2024



The floral arrangements at Chichester Cathedral Festival of Flowers in early June were truly magnificent.

The theme this year was *Creation* and those who had so magically transformed the cathedral into a delicate floral enclave certainly created an awe-inspiring atmosphere.

Upon entering the cathedral, visitors were greeted by an ambience reminiscent of a meadow in full bloom.

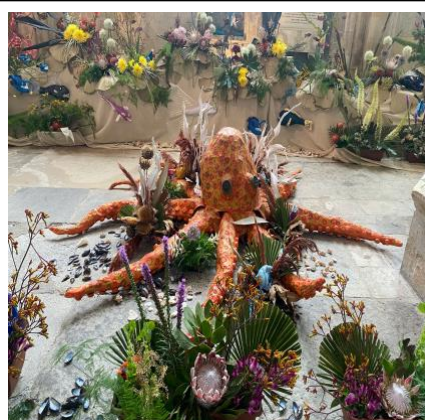
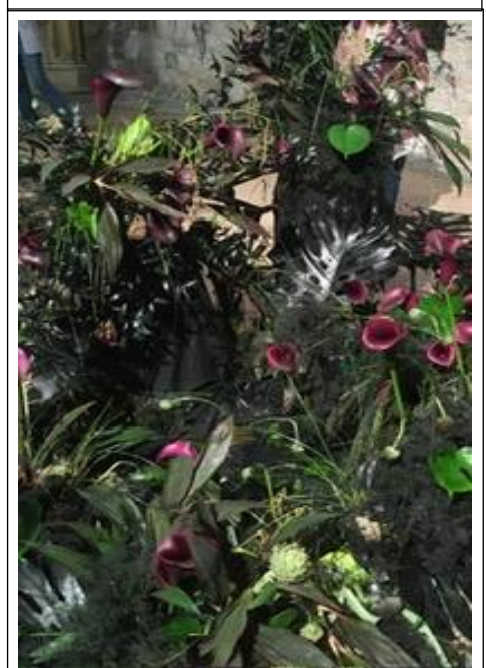


The soft pastel tones, natural flowing grasses and floral scents drew one fully in to a sensory immersive experience, where the magic of floristry had transformed the nave and surrounding aisles into a floral haven.



There were 60 arrangements all based on different interpretations of *Creation* with inspiration taken from the book of Genesis, with swaying floral planets hanging from high above, to an arrangement of sea creatures from the ocean's depths. The colour and structure of the flowers conveyed powerful stories, such as the "*Good versus Evil*" arrangements.

"*Good*" was pure white flowers - Lilies, *Gypsopola* and *Lunaria*, with a bright fresh green foliage, all soft and flowing. Whereas the colouring of "*Evil*" was deep purples, blacks and darker shades of green; using spiky globe artichokes, dark ferns, flax and other large rigid structural leaves.



The use of artificial oasis foam to create the arrangements was banned this year, so the clever use of chicken wire balls, jam jars and other recyclable materials was encouraged and used in some arrangements as a key part of the artistic creation.

It is well worth a visit in future years, it certainly rivals Chelsea as a floral extravaganza. Perhaps one day we may even create our own Ashurst floral festival!

Michael Fairless and the Roadmender

The Roadmender was written in the 1800s about the Adur Valley and very much to Edwardian tastes. The author had a deep love of the countryside which is so evident in her book, The Roadmender, and in fact Michael Fairless was a woman, Margaret Barber, using her middle name Fairless and the Christian name of a dear childhood friend, Michael McDonnell.

Margaret Barber was born in the West Riding of Yorkshire, the youngest of 3 daughters. When her father died, her mother being unable to cope, sent her to relatives in Torquay where she attended a local school and became an avid reader.

In 1884 she went to London to train as a nurse in a children's hospital but, suffering from a spinal condition, her health deteriorated to such an extent that she became unable to look after herself. She was adopted by the Dowson family who lived in Henfield where she died in August 1901.

In her lifetime she wrote a number of books but probably the most successful, The Roadmender, was reprinted 31 times in ten years becoming a huge success and it is still available on both Amazon and Kindle.

Her grave lies to the Eastern side of the churchyard of St. James's Ashurst and bears the epitaph "Lo how I loved thee".

A short extract from The Roadmender illustrates her deep love of nature and the countryside which we are all so privileged to enjoy living in Ashurst.

'The coppice at our back is full of birds, for it is far from the road and they nest there undisturbed year after year. Through the still night I heard the nightingales calling, calling, until I could bear it no longer and went softly out into the luminous dark.

The little wood was manifold with sound, I heard my little brothers who move by night rustling in grass and tree. A hedgehog crossed my path with a dull squeak, the bats shrilled high to the stars, a white owl swept past me crying his hunting note, a beetle boomed suddenly in my face, and above and through it all the nightingales sang - and sang!'



Churchyard Notes

Summer 2024

On 9th June, we had a church service entitled God's Acre, a celebration of St James's Churchyard. Father Mark pointed out the interesting etymology of the term God's Acre which, while working brilliantly in English, actually comes from the German, Gottesacker (Field of God), an ancient designation for a burial ground.

The three key points made at the service were:

- (1) we are fortunate to have such a historic Churchyard which is a great place for peaceful reflection, full of bird noise and hopefully plentiful colour from wild flowers, trees, butterflies etc
- (2) it provides precious habitat in a nature depleted environment as the ground has escaped being tilled, fertilised or sprayed with multiple species of flora in evidence across the year, over 100 according to a 2016 botanical survey, and
- (3) we manage it to provide both mowed areas to wander around in and more natural areas where we can enjoy the wildlife and see what species emerge from year to year; with these areas cleared at the end of summer and the grass clippings collected and taken away.

The churchyard is, as noted above, a burial ground and it was reiterated at the service that, if anyone wants a pathway kept clear to a particular grave, that wish can easily be accommodated. Also mentioned at the service was the local writer, Michael Fairless, whose grave is anonymous but with the epitaph 'Lo how I loved thee' and is kept cleared.

We had a good wander round the Churchyard both during and after the service. The birdsong is exceptional at this time of year with for example song thrush, blackcap and treecreeper all having been recorded recently. And one or two brave souls were tempted into tasting sorrel and ribwort plantain, well-known foragers' fare, which are currently showing strongly.

So the message to all Ashurst residents and visitors is - make use of our lovely Churchyard!

Speedwatch and Speed Restrictions within the Parish

The Council is exploring funding possibilities to purchase a Speed Indicator Device (SID) for the village. The cheapest SIDs cost around £2,750 while the more sophisticated ones are in the region of £3,550. The plan would be to run this by solar panels. After conversations with our County Councillor, the Council is optimistic that it will be able to arrange for a 40mph buffer zone between the national speed limit zone and the village.

Ashurst Nature Notes

Summer 2024

May 2024 was widely reported in the media as the hottest ever May worldwide - a conclusion that would have been very surprising to shivering and damp Ashurst residents. But it is a good reminder that the impact of climate change is spread unevenly across the globe and we are becoming aware that the implications for UK agriculture may be significant.

On a different subject, we have a wide spread of raptors around Ashurst - owls, sparrowhawks, kestrels, buzzards and red kites are regularly spotted. Apparently, the UK's largest raptor, the re-introduced white tailed eagle, with a massive 2.5 metre wing span, has been spotted in the skies of Sussex, although I have yet to come across anyone in Ashurst who has spied it - it would be interesting if anyone has.

Summer has arrived late this year, yet the birds have been busy nesting and the amount of water around has been good for many creatures, including insects like midges which we may not particularly like but are all part of the ecosystem. Now is the time to look out for the most spectacular - damselflies and dragonflies.

Church Cleaning

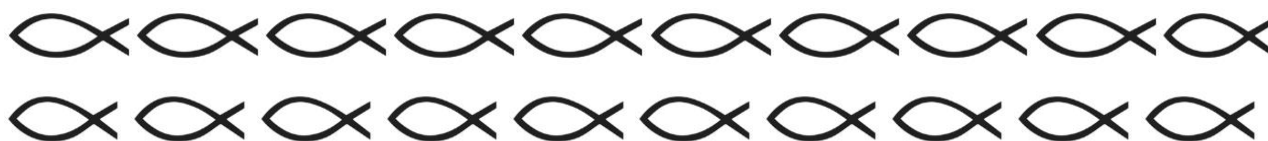
