Father Mark writes:



Dear Friends

As a boy I wrote something for my English teacher about the pleasure I took in kicking my way through fallen autumn leaves, in breathing in the seasonal autumn smells and noticing, each year, that particular day when the scent of autumn is first in the air; not to mention, as the autumn went on, the unique smell of smoke and fireworks. It is a sign of my becoming an adult that nowadays fallen leaves stand for hard work, and fireworks cause me irritation as they disturb my peace and quiet.

But 'the Child is the Father of the man', as William Wordsworth puts it. I still love the autumn, even though it is not entirely a happy time, carrying as it does a sense of wistfulness for the summer gone, an awareness of the dark nights growing and therefore of time running away from us. So perhaps it's inevitable that, each autumn, the church's year reminds us of heaven; beginning in late September with the feast of St Michael and all Angels (accompanied by his

seasonal daisies); going on in early November to celebrate All Hallows and its eve, and praying in All Souls-tide for the repose of the faithful departed; and, in December, remembering that 'Advent' was never intended to be a count-down to Christmas but rather an anticipation for the end of all things – recalling how our Lord told us to prepare ourselves for his second coming, to judge the living and the dead.

Of course, he also told us that to enter the Kingdom of Heaven only we must live as little children; given that, I'm pleased this reflection has inspired me to look up Wordsworth's poem, to find that this is exactly what the great poet was writing about: how we are lost if we forget the sense of wonder at his creation of a world he wanted to share with us, to make us ready for the all the joys of heaven.

Open the Book at Ashurst Primary School





A brief update on what we have been up to over the last few months.

Broadband in Ashurst

There are no real up-dates on the Broadband. We are waiting to hear back from Open Reach for the Partridge Green Exchange and with the Southern Exchange, while we believe work has started we have no dates for completion yet. For further information, please email Ashurst.broadband@outlook.com

Community Speedwatch

The Ashurst Village Council Speedwatch Group has been active in the heart of the village on the B2135 since June. The Group has 9 volunteers who freely give up their time to monitor and record speeds through the village in an effort to reduce excessive speeds and encourage drivers to adhere to the speed limits.

Each driver recorded at driving at an excessive speed is sent a formal letter from the Police and so far 86 letters have been sent from a total of 1283 recorded vehicles (6.7%) The fastest recorded speed has been 48mph in the 30mph zone.

In addition to the letters received, one driver had no valid MOT certificate, two vehicles were not taxed and one other driver was driving whilst the vehicle was SORN registered. The Police have taken further action with regard to those drivers.

Whilst the percentage of drivers driving at excessive speeds is relatively low, the continued presence of the Speedwatch Operators will ensure that this continues to be the case and the aim is to reduce that figure over time.

There is no rota or commitment to regular sessions required. Sessions are entirely dependent on the availability and willingness of the volunteers to give up their time as they are able. Full training will be given.

Our Tree Warden

Our Tree Warden makes regular tree inspections in Ashurst and provides feedback on any issues of concern.

Earlier this year, extensive work was carried out on all the Recreation Ground trees by way of taking away any deadwood. Additionally, following professional assessment, major surgery is due on the large Oak. This 'severe trim' is scheduled to take place after Christmas.

Our Tree warden has also provided an update on those trees planted on the Recreation Ground earlier this year. The salient point being that we may need some help in the near future! You will have noticed that the weeds and grass have grown rather well around all those small trees that Ashurst residents and the School helped to plant in March. So we will shortly need to carry out some ongoing maintenance! As our tree warden points out, weeding and clearing round the new plants is as integral part of successful planting as is watering in dry weather.

As regards the bigger donated saplings, these have exceeded all expectations as to growth and health. The hazel wand protection has lasted very well but it is likely that these will need to be replaced later on. With regard to the threat from deer, the most vulnerable time will be early spring – so let's hope a deer fence works.

Vigilance with respect to watering will be needed for at least the next 3 years.

In April, we had a serious blackfly attack on the bird cherry, but one spray in the tops of the tree tubes seemed to fix this.

Recreation Ground

Ashurst is so fortunate to have its own Recreation Ground, for us all to enjoy. This was particularly evident during Covid when we were pleased to see how much it was used - by dog walkers, joggers, individuals playing football and even someone honing their golf skills!

While the School is now back and making full use of its 'extended playground', the Cricket Club and the Football Club have been unable to use the Ground and the Buildings during Covid. For them, it will take some time to assess what future 'normal usage' might be.

The Trustees regularly inspect the Recreation Ground to check that everything is in order and to see what maintenance work needs to be done to both the Ground and the Buildings. The fate of both the Cricket Pavilion and the John Eaton Hut, will need to be considered in the not-too distant future, since both buildings are gradually deteriorating. Either these buildings will need to be repaired or eventually replaced. If replaced, the idea of amalgamating the two buildings into just one sports building seems like a good idea. We now need to assess what the long-term, post-Pandemic, demands of a sports building might be and our various options.

Meanwhile the Council is very keen to encourage sport to be played again on the Recreation Ground, so if anyone has any ideas, please let us know.

Neighbourhood Plan

The idea of putting together a Neighbourhood Plan for Ashurst, has been discussed once more. It is felt that we should be thinking about having one. We will discuss with Horsham about how best to proceed with this.

Rampion 2 - Current proposals for underground cabling through Ashurst

We have not yet had any feedback on the Rampion formal Consultation that took place earlier this Autumn. Our Member of Parliament, Andrew Griffith, wrote to Rampion, making various representations on behalf of the community affected by the proposed Rampion route. Held this year on 5 September, visitors enjoyed perfect weather and came along in large numbers. The amount raised for hall expenses exceeded all previous shows, being in the region of £6,400. Huge thanks are in order for all the hard work carried out by the organizing committee.

At the last meeting of the Hall Trustees it was agreed that the hall hire charges discount for Ashurst Residents should be increased from 25% to 50% in recognition of all the support for the Dog Show.

Regular bookings for the hall are slowly returning to their pre-pandemic levels, and the ever popular children's parties are making an appearance.

The car park was recently resurfaced following alterations to the surface water drainage and the surrounding edges have been planted with daffodils and wild flower seeds.

As world leaders gathered in Glasgow for COP26, it has certainly felt as if climate change is firmly upon us. Autumn has been dry and warm with the leaves, oak in particular, seemingly only changing colour and falling to the ground with the greatest reluctance.


Autumn is a great time for birdwatching as the migration season gets underway in all directions; from swallows gathering on telegraph wires preparing to fly to Africa to geese arriving from arctic breeding grounds. Visits to RSPB Pulborough Brooks and WWT Arundel are thoroughly recommended while in Ashurst we have our own stretches of the Adur to catch sight of many waterfowl.

It's also been a noisy time for birds of prey as the youngsters leave the nest and try to establish their own territory. Barn owls, tawny owls, little owls, kestrels, sparrowhawks, buzzards and red kites can all regularly be seen or heard in the Ashurst area.

Time now to get the birdfeeders going to cheer up winter days by watching the fascinating spectacle of song birds and other hungry visitors to the tasty and ready meal on offer.
