Welcome to the final article for this academic year, which once again features the memories (only slightly amended to fit the space) of a local Y6 pupil, leaving to attend Steyning Grammar School from September 2016, in the footsteps of his older brother whose individual 'Y6 Memories' featured in this magazine at the end of his respective Y6.

......I don't remember much about my first day at school, I think I was quite scared and hid behind my mum. The first friend I made was Flynn Cresswell. I went up to him, at the big red Lego box and we became friends instantly!

I was really scared when I was doing my first Sports Day; I was in the Yellows so I sat with them by the side of the track. Whenever it was our turn to race, I started to worry, all those eyes staring at us. But, at the end of the Day, I turned out to really like it because of our own 'Go to Bed' race.

One of my favourite things about Y1 was half way through it, Seth Tamlyn joined! He and I became friends straight away as I had to read to him. I remember in Y1 doing P.E on the field with Mrs Smith, or Ms Evans as she was then. My favourite thing was the Hoop game, where you had to find a hoop to go in and out of and each time Mrs Smith or Mrs Pocket would take away a hoop so it became more and more difficult.

In Y2 I remember writing lots of stories about Doctor Who and sharing them with the class. Flynn helped.
